What is TRIO?

TRIO is a set of federally-funded college opportunity programs that motivate and support students from disadvantaged backgrounds in their pursuit of a college degree. Almost 800,000 low income, first-generation, and students with disabilities—from sixth grade through college graduation—are served by over 2,800 programs nationally. TRIO programs provide academic tutoring, personal counseling, mentoring, financial guidance, and other supports necessary for educational access and retention. TRIO programs provide direct support services for students.

Indiana TRIO

In 2019, Indiana is home to 35 TRIO programs. These programs bring in over \$10 million in federal funding to support the educational attainment of Indiana residents—positively impacting the lives of 9,180 Hoosiers.

Why Are TRIO Programs Important in Indiana?

TRIO programs are helping Hoosier students from low-income and first-generation homes close the educational attainment gap. TRIO programs assist with high school and college completion of participants and work for the development of a more educated Indiana.





Within 3 Years




Bachelor's Degree

High School Retention & Graduation




Post Secondary Enrollment

The program encourages students to complete high school and enroll in post-secondary education. The program may also serve high school drop outs up to age 27 by encouraging and preparing these individuals to re-enter the educational system and complete their education.

Upward Bound

Upward Bound provides intensive academic support to high school participants preparing for college entrance. Students must have completed the eighth grade and be between the ages of 13-19, enrolled in high school, planning to go to college, and need program services to fulfill their educational goals. The overall goal of Upward Bound is to increase the rate at which participants complete secondary education and enroll in and graduate from intuitions of post-secondary education. The Upward Bound program also provide a six-week summer experience on a college campus to acclimate and prepare students for college entry and post- secondary educational success.

Aldo Medina



This May, Aldo Medina will graduate from Arsenal Technical High School as the Valedictorian of his class. Since Aldo began Upward Bound his freshman year, he has gotten very involved in the local political scene. Aldo is the chairman for the Indiana Youth Advisory Council where is responsible for organizing council meetings, preparing council reports to the General Assembly, and represents the Council in official meetings with state legislators and other state agencies.

As the Chairman, he organized the council's first ever *Legislative Day* on the statehouse grounds, led the adoption of an official application process that facilitates the speed of member appointments, submitted two Reports to the General Assembly (including the council's first-ever "Bill Endorsements" publication), and established a dedicated website for the Council. Currently, Aldo is one of two (2) Indiana delegates to the 2020 United States Senate Youth Program (USSYP), a highly competitive, week-long educational experience and scholarship sponsored by the United States Senate for secondary school students interested in public service. He is the first delegate selected from the Indianapolis Public Schools district since 1975.

Aldo was accepted into Harvard and will join the Class of 2024. He hopes to continue his political journey in college while he obtains a degree in Humanities. He dreams of a day where experiences like his—the experience of jumping from the classrooms of a public high school straight into the ones at an Ivy League university—aren't seen as uncommon or extraordinary. Aldo states that the "Homeless to Harvard"-style stories like his shouldn't be inspiring. Instead, they should be commonplace. "I hope that one day, students everywhere can receive an equitable education regardless if they hail from low-income neighborhoods or from wealthy, tight-knit suburbs."

Student Support Services

Student Support Service programs are located at institutions of higher education. These programs provide opportunities for academic development, assist students with basic college requirements, and help to motivate students toward the successful completion of their postsecondary education. The primary goals of SSS programs are to increase the college retention and graduation rates of its participants at the host institution.

Kayla Patrick



Kayla Patrick is a tenacious and passionate spirit. As a native of Michigan City, Indiana, Purdue Northwest was her first-choice school. Kayla had a relationship with the university through her involvement in College Bound. Kayla immediately connected with TRIO Student Support Services her freshman year. Her strengths in communication led to her participation in various leadership capacities within TRIO.

In the summer of 2018, Kayla was awarded a scholarship to participate in a 10-day educational immersion trip in China. Only two TRIO Student Support Services participants were selected for this experience. Despite language barriers, Kayla thrived in connecting with locals. "This was an experience you couldn't get inside your comfort zone. It's all about pushing yourself outside of your comfort zone and that's definitely what we did," says Kayla Patrick.

Kayla's narrative is one of overcoming barriers. From instabilities at home to lack of academic confidence to financial struggles, Kayla has triumphed each time. After graduation in 2018, Kayla worked for a non-profit organization. While the work was service oriented and it aligned with her career goals, she couldn't forget the joy she experienced in China. In November 2019, Kayla accepted a position with English First, an international education company that specializes in language training. She has moved to Wuxi, China to teach for 15 months. Her classroom is comprised of Chinese locals age 3-15 with the goal of strengthening their English language skills. Through her own determination and support from TRIO, Kayla is stepping out of her comfort zone again. She takes pride in being a Purdue Northwest and TRIO alum.

Ronald E. McNair Post Baccalaureate Program

The Ronald E. McNair program prepares students for doctoral studies through involvement in research and other scholarly activities. Participants are from disadvantaged backgrounds and have demonstrated strong academic potential. Institutions work closely with participants as they complete their undergraduate degrees. Institutions encourage participants to enroll in graduate programs then track their progress through to successful completion of advanced degrees. The goal is to increase the attainment of Ph.D. degrees by students from underrepresented segments of society.

Jerilyn Gillenwater



Jerilyn Gillenwater '20 is a McNair and Bonner Scholar. The neuroscience major has been actively serving the neighborhoods surrounding campus by volunteering with youth-serving organizations like Head Start, Girls Inc., and the Townsend Center. After graduation, she aspires to become a midwife and make a difference in the lives of families in her hometown of St. Louis.

"My mom and my uncle work in critical care, and I grew up hearing stories of sick and dying people, stabbings, shootings, accidents," Gillenwater says. "I found these stories super interesting, but I knew I wanted something different."

Her journey toward that goal has already begun. With funding from the EPIC Advantage, she landed an internship that quickly revealed one way to use her talents to benefit others.

Gillenwater interned last summer at the Jamaa Birthing Village, where she learned that the traditional hospital posture of giving birth on your back is one of the worst ways to give birth.

"At birthing centers or at home, mothers are on all fours, which is an easier way to give birth," she says. "The U.S. has one of the highest C-section rates, which contributes to the U.S. having high rates of infant and maternal mortality, especially among women of color."

Gillenwater was struck by the caring, humility, and dedication of the midwives she worked with were. She also appreciated how midwives and nurse midwives have a more personal and extended connection with the mothers and communities they serve. Gillenwater's plan is to become a nurse midwife, a path that requires graduate study and nurse certification.
